

PROGRAMME 4: ACTIVITIES IN GARDEN ROUTE 2019/20-20/21





State Veteringrian Office -Oudtshoorn

- Ostriches Testing against Avian Influenza (9023), Newcastle Disease (2735) and National Residue Monitoring Program
- Cattle Brucellosis (352) and Tuberculosis (441) testing
- School visits 6 school talks reaching 776 children in rural schools (schools in towns visited as part of the rabies awareness excluded)
- PAHC 38 sessions with 320 people attending, 1029 animals presented and 796 treatments/dipping done
- CCS Vet Clinic weekly clinics held at the SV Oudtshoorn offices in conjunction with welfare organizations assisting the resource poor communities. Outreaches to developing farmers with clinical assistance, extension, education and training.
- Mobile clinic 19 outreaches with 206 sterilizations to various resource poor communities in the Ladismith, Calitzdorp, Oudtshoorn and De Rust areas during the year.
- Registration of export facilities, ostrich farms and PAPPA registered facilities

During the financial year 2019/2020 from quarter 1 to 3 various courses were presented at 3 venues of which the ASD: George Training centre was the main venue for all training on all projects within the Garden route district.



PROGRAMME 4: ACTIVITIES PROVINCIAL 2019/20-20/21

PAPA Exclusions – security animals

- Original legislation excluded:
 - Exhibition of dogs/horses by police/military
 - Use of dogs for safeguarding by military/police/prisons
- Household dogs guarding a home = PET
- Privately owned dog used to guard business property = WORKING ANIMAL (not a pet) - grey area
 - Municipal working dogs licensing?
 - Municipal dog kennel licence / registration?

- ☐ Fiscal pressures-budget cut-less money for projects.
- ☐ Worst Drought in history recorded-Since 2015 under normal rainfall
- Water security for Agriculture as well as urban communities
- ☐ Climate change and its impact on food security
- Animal Health-(Controlling/preventing pests and diseases)
- □ Access to land (Not WCDoA mandate)
- Rural Safety



POSSIBLE SOLUTIONS

POSSIBLE SOLUTIONS

- ☐ Challenge to work more efficient and smarter with available resources
- ☐ Adopt and implement SMART Agri Plan principles
- Water security is priority/Alternative water sources to be investigated
- ☐ Drought response plan for Little Karoo (include wider region P/Albert and parts of C/Winelands Little Karoo area)
- Opportunities for new creative ideas/alternative crops/ Role of research important-Alternative Crops Fund (ACF), 4th IR and technology development
- Sourcing of alternative and quicker responding external funding
